The Titanic was a big, luxurious ship, with fantastic libraries, sports facilities, and swimming pools on the ship. On April 10, 1912, it left Southampton, England on its first trip. There were 2,224 people on the ship. Some of the passengers were famous politicians, writers, and very rich business people. There were also many poor passengers, traveling from Europe to the U.S. to start a new life.

On April 14, 1912, four days after the Titanic left England, it hit a large iceberg in the middle of the ocean. The ship started to sink. There weren't enough lifeboats for all the passengers. The captain ordered, "Women and children first!" When the ship sank a few hours later, only 705 people were in the lifeboats. Over 1,500 died when the ship went down.

Another big ship, the Carpathia, came to help the survivors in the lifeboats. It took them back to New York City. After the disaster, there was an investigation. Many things changed. Now, communication on ships is better. And, more importantly, all ships must have enough lifeboats for everyone on the ship.
