ulie Darnell is sixteen years old, and she loves acting. It's her passion! Julie goes to a special high school for drama students in Houston, Texas. This is her typical day.

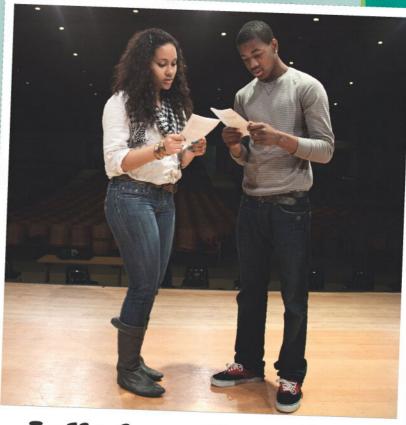

HIP-HOP

Pants for boys and girls are big and baggy. Boys' T-shirts are big, too, but girls' tops are smaller and tighter. Hip-hop style is modern, but it has a long history. It began in the 1920s with jazz music. Men often wore big, baggy suits called *zoot suits*!

GRUNGE

The grunge style started with grunge music in the U.S. It's a lot more comfortable than other styles because the clothes are casual – just jeans and shirts, in plain colors. They're cheaper, too! Just don't wear anything very new – or very clean!

PUNK

The punk style comes from punk music in the 1970s. It isn't as easy or as comfortable as other styles. It's really hard work! Punks have to color and style their hair often. Their clothes are also tighter than other styles, and usually black. Make-up is also really important for punks.

JAPANESE STREET

This style is more creative than others because everybody looks different – and strange! The idea is to wear more unusual clothes than anyone else. You also want crazier make-up and a more bizarre hairstyle. Some people also like to dress like action heroes and fantasy characters.

HIPPIE

This style is from the late 1960s, but it comes back again and again. The hippie style expresses ideas of nature, peace, and freedom. It is also more artistic than many other styles. Hippie clothes are colorful, and they often have flowers and other patterns on them.

DAMS AROUND THE WORLD

There are now 5.6 billion people on the planet. They need water to drink, to irrigate plants for food, to supply hydroelectric energy, to travel on, and to have fun in. While dams help with these things, they also cause damage.

Three Gorges Dam – China

This dam is very modern. Engineers finished work in 2012 and its main purpose is to provide energy for a big part of China. It also helps control flooding of the Yangtze River and bigger ships can use the Yangtze River, too. However the dam flooded several archaeological and cultural sites. Over 1.3 million people had to leave the area, too.

Itaipu Dam — Brazil and Paraguay

This dam is one of the largest in the world. Built by Brazil and Paraguay, it supplies 90 percent of the energy that Paraguay uses, and 19 percent of Brazil's energy. The dam is helpful to many people, but 10,000 families had to move to build the dam. The dam harmed the environment, too. It destroyed one of the world's largest waterfalls: Guaíra Falls. Itaipu Dam is one of the most expensive projects ever built.

Aswan Dam – Egypt

This dam helps control flooding of the Nile River. Before the dam, there was sometimes too much water in the river, and sometimes not enough. It was difficult to plant crops and feed all the people dependent on the river. The dam controls the river and Egypt produces more food. The dam also supplies energy and transportation, and provides jobs. But, to build the dam, over 100,000 people had to move, and the government moved some important archaeological sites. Some people say the dam has caused erosion and health problems to the people who live near it.

The Paralympic Games is a major sports event, every four years, similar to the Olympic Games, except it's for athletes with physical and intellectual disabilities. The athletes come from all over the world and there are summer and winter Paralympic Games. These happen directly after the Olympic Games, using the same gyms, swimming pools, skiing, and track facilities as the Olympics.

There are more than 20 sports in the summer Games and five sports in the winter Games. The sports sometimes change, just like they do in the Olympic Games, reflecting the popularity of a sport or the number of countries that sends participants. For the 2018 winter Games, there are probably going to be some new sports: sliding sports like bobsleigh, luge, and skeleton.

The Paralympic Games are becoming more and more popular. At first, it was a small event which happened in 1948 for British veterans of World War II who were injured and had disabilities. In 1960, it became an international event and 400 athletes from 23 countries participated. At that time, only people in wheelchairs could participate. Now, athletes with lots of disabilities can participate. The 2012 Games in London had over 4,200 athletes from 164 countries. Over 700,000 volunteers worked at the Games and 2.7 million people bought tickets to see the events.

Paralympians show the world the four Paralympic values: determination, courage, equality, and inspiration. Many young disabled people have been inspired by watching the Paralympics.

Ryan Campbell is a pilot from Australia. He had his first lesson when he was 14. But, at age 19, was he too young to set a world record?

On June 30, 2013, Ryan started his trip around the world. For 70 days, he flew alone in his airplane, and it wasn't always easy. In flying 44,448 km, he had a lot of adventures. He landed his plane in 15 different countries, and he flew over glaciers, oceans, volcanoes, and deserts.



On September 7, 2013, after 200 hours in the air, Ryan set a world record. He was the youngest person to fly solo around the world and the first teenager to do it. Flying, he said, was "magic". What are his plans now? Some people say that children are too young to think about flying planes, but Ryan wants to help children and teenagers learn about aviation. 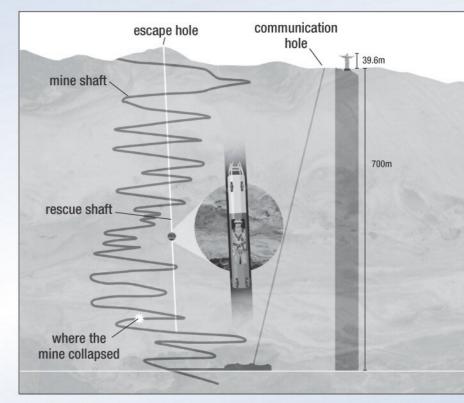
THE 33 SURVIVORS

On August 5th, 2010, 33 Chilean miners went to work in the San José mine, in the Atacama Desert in Chile. On October 14th, 2010, 69 days later, the last miner came home from work.

The miners were working hard in a mine 700 meters underground when part of the mine collapsed. The

miners only had a little fish, a few cookies, and a little milk to eat and drink.

Above the miners, rescuers were working quickly to find them. They were digging and listening carefully. After seventeen days, the rescuers contacted the miners. After that, Chile and the world waited. Food started to arrive for the miners through a special hole. They talked to their families for the first time.



Machines with special equipment began to dig an escape hole at the end of August. The rescue team rescued the first miner safely on October 13th, and the rescue ended happily 22 hours and 37 minutes later.

The miners are now all doing different things. Some are spending more time with their families. One of the miners is enjoying spending time with his new baby daughter; others are exercising more and running marathons. They are all just happy to be alive.
